DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Coconut Cake—a delicious treat that can often evoke feelings of happiness and satisfaction.

That is exactly what I felt every time I ate a piece of my grandmother's creation. It was simply the best and my personal favorite. So, upon receiving a copy of this script I was instantly drawn in by its title.

The coconut is said to be a symbol of fertility, protection, and purification in many cultures. It may represent the feminine aspect of life-giving nourishment, as well as resilience and adaptability in harsh environments.

These elements are explored in Melda Beaty's Coconut Cake; a dramatic-comedy, dramedy, if you will; about a group of senior retirees coming to terms with their past and the realities of their present. As the men gather at the neighborhood McDonalds on Mondays to shoot-the-breeze over a game of chess, stories are told, secrets revealed, and friendships are tested.

The play symbolizes life as a game of chess governed by the spiritual constitution of man navigating its terrain at various stages—represented by chess pieces; i.e., King (Spirit), Queen (Mind), Bishop (Emotions), Knight (Vitality), Rooks (Physical Body), Pawns (Sensory Impulses and Perceptive Faculties). The game represents our freewill and ability to operate within the confines of natural law; our dual nature of the internal and external struggles of life. For everything that is true the opposite is also true. As humans we can be good and bad, loving and hateful, honest and deceptive, friend and foe; it's all relative to the view and perception of the individual. Life is a struggle against threats real and perceived, and the battle wages for the purpose of self-preservation as we seek to find our *Coconut Cake*.

I want to thank Nate Jacobs and his entire team for a wonderful experience during my directorial debut here at the Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe. To the cast and crew, thank you for the hard work and dedication to the process, and trusting my vision to bring this piece from the page to the stage. Thank you, Melda, for the blueprint you have given; for in the beginning was the word. Most of all, I thank God for the opportunity and gift of storytelling. I dedicate this production to my late grandmother, Christine Byrd, and her coconut cake.

Now sit back, relax and enjoy a slice of a cake, and when you depart our hope is that you leave feeling happy and satisfied.

MELDA BEATY is a passionate playwright. Her first play, *Front Porch Society*, enjoyed a world premiere at The Ensemble Theatre in Houston, TX (2017), and a mainstage production at the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, NC (2019). Her second play, *Coconut Cake*, was a semi-finalist for American Blues Theatre Blue Ink Playwrighting Award and had readings at the National Black Theatre Festival (2017), ReadFest in Houston, TX (2017), and St. Louis Black Rep (2020). Her one-act stage play, *Thirty*, was a finalist in the Blackboard Play Festival (2021) and WayWard Sisters Third Annual Workshopping Women's Voices (2021). Melda's recent play with music, *The Lawsons: A Civil Rights Love Story*, was commissioned by The Ensemble Theatre for their 2021–2022 season. She was a 2021 Confluence Fellow with the St. Louis Shakespeare Festival.

Her upcoming short film, *Cupcake*, chronicles the divide mental illness creates between a mother and daughter. In addition, she is an author of two books, performance review editor for TBTR (the *Black Theatre Review*), and freelance contributor to *Black Masks* magazine. Melda resides in Chicago, Illinois with her three talented daughters where she works as an assistant professor of English at Olive-Harvey Community College. She earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and her Masters at Illinois State University. Melda is also a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated, Black Theatre Network, and the African American Playwrights Group.

NATE JACOBS* (Founder/Artistic Director) is Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe's Founder & Artistic Director. He is a driving force in Florida's theatre scene. A graduate

of Florida A&M

University, Nate founded Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe in 1999. He has written, composed, directed and performed in many shows, as an actor, singer, dancer and comedian. He works extensively in the community, training and mentoring youth in the performing arts. As a result of his outstanding contributions to young people, the Sarasota County Branch NAACP Youth Council recognized Nate as one of its 2012 Men of Valor. In the spring of 2013, he was inducted into the Community Video Archives Hall of Fame for his significant contributions to the arts and education. In 2015, Nate was recognized as a Champion of Diversity for The Arts during the Biz (941) and La Guia magazines' Unity Awards Luncheon, and was honored with the prestigious Larry Leon Hamlin Producer Award during the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C., "for his contributions to Black theatre specifically and American theatre in general." In 2017, Goodwill Manasota named him a Community Ambassador of the Year. In 2018, the Arts and Cultural Alliance of Sarasota County honored Nate with the Arts Leadership Award for Artistic Achievement. In 2021 Nate received the Perfect Pitch Award from Key Chorale, which recognized him as a driving force in the arts and for his collaborations with other arts organizations, including American Roots: The Gospel Experience, a series of concert performances with WBTT performers and Key Chorale presented in three area churches in the fall of 2019. In August 2022 he brought Soul Crooners. Featuring Sistas in the Name of Soul to the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C. — WBTT's fifth appearance there. He was featured in The New York Times in December 2021, in an article highlighting his mentorship and leadership, as well as WBTT's community outreach.



LUTHER D. WELLS (Director) - Luther serves as Associate Director of Theatre at Florida A&M University (FAMU). He earned his BS in Theatre from FAMU and an MFA in Theatre from Ohio

State University. He's worked as an actor, director, and choreographer for the M Ensemble Theatre Company and the African Heritage Cultural Arts Center of Miami. Directing credits include the Off-Broadway production of Sugar Ray: Two Trains Running, Clyde's, Chicken & Biscuits, From the Mississippi Delta, The Waiting Room, Hands Up!, King Hedley II, Little Shop of Horror, Radio Golf, Gem of the Ocean, The Colored Museum, and The Color Purple; Oedipus, Beyond Therapy, Blue, Home, Jitney, Tartuffe, Antigone, Dreamgirls, and Joe Turner's Come and Gone to name a few.
