

Charles Fuller's play A Soldier's Play exposes us to individuals we seldom see on the theatre stage: the African American patriot. During World War II, Black Americans both volunteered and were drafted to serve in all branches of our then-segregated armed forces. While most were assigned to various rear support groups, they all longed for and some did experience combat on the war's front lines. They served on the beaches at Normandy, and Saipan. They flew and protected our bombers over Germany. And while they weren't always where they wanted to be, they were always where they needed to be. They answered the call!

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Charles Fuller (b. March 5, 1939 – d. October 3, 2022) was an American playwright best known for his Pulitzer Prize winning drama *A Soldier's Play.* He attended Villanova University and joined the army in 1959. After leaving the army in 1962, he attended La Salle College, graduating in 1967. He co-founded the Afro-American Arts Theatre in 1967 in Philadelphia.

A Soldier's Play was published in 1981 and earned Fuller a number of awards, including a Tony award for Best Revival of a Play in 2020 when it debuted on Broadway. He also wrote the screenplay for the 1984 film that earned him an Academy Award nomination. He has written a number of plays centered around the experience of African American soldiers including The Brownsville Raid based on the actual events involving the dishonorable discharge of an entire Black U.S. Army regiment for inciting a riot in 1906. A Soldier's Play was the catalyst for a series of work based on African American soldiers during the Civil War and Reconstruction period called the We Cycle. It includes works such as Sally (1988), Prince (1988), Jonquil (1990), and Burner's Frolic (1990).

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NATE JACOBS*

(Founder/Artistic Director) is Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe's Founder & Artistic Director. He is a driving force in Florida's theatre scene. A graduate of Florida A&M

University, Nate founded Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe in 1999. He has written, composed, directed and performed in many shows, as an actor, singer, dancer and comedian. He works extensively in the community, training and mentoring youth in the performing arts. As a result of his outstanding contributions to young people, the Sarasota County Branch NAACP Youth Council recognized Nate as one of its 2012 Men of Valor. In the spring of 2013, he was inducted into the Community Video Archives Hall of Fame for his significant contributions to the arts and education. In 2015, Nate was recognized as a Champion of Diversity for the arts during the Biz (941) and La Guia magazines' Unity Awards Luncheon, and was honored with the prestigious Larry Leon Hamlin Producer Award during the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C., "for his contributions to Black theatre specifically and American theatre in general." In 2017, Goodwill Manasota named him a Community Ambassador of the Year. In 2018, the Arts and Cultural Alliance of Sarasota County honored Nate with the Arts Leadership Award for Artistic Achievement. In August 2022 he brought Soul Crooners, featuring Sistas in the Name of Soul to the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C. — WBTT's fifth appearance there. In 2021 Nate received the Perfect Pitch Award from Key Chorale, which recognized him as a driving force in the arts and for his collaborations with other arts organizations, including American Roots: The Gospel Experience, a series of concert performances with WBTT performers and Key Chorale presented in three area churches in the fall of 2019. He was recently featured in The New York Times, highlighting his mentorship and leadership, as well as WBTT's community outreach.



CHUCK SMITH*

(Director) is a Resident Director (a.k.a. resident snowbird) here at the Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe. His WBTT credits include Flyin' West, Knock Me A Kiss, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom,

The Piano Lesson, The Mountaintop, and The Amen Corner. In Chicago he is an associate member of the American Blues Theater Company, and a member of the Goodman Theatre's Board of Trustees, as well as the Goodman Theatre's Resident Director. His Goodman credits include the world premieres of By the Music of the Spheres, The Gift Horse, and Objects in the Mirror; the Chicago premieres of Pullman Porter Blues, Race, Having Our Say, The Good Negro, Proof, The Story, and By the Way, Meet Vera Stark. He directed James Baldwin's The Amen Corner, which transferred to Boston's Huntington Theatre Company, where it won the Independent Reviewers of New England (IRNE) Award for Best Direction. He also directed A Raisin in the Sun, Blues for an Alabama Sky, August Wilson's Gem of the Ocean, Two Trains Running and Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, the 1993 to 1995 productions of A Christmas Carol, Ain't Misbehavin', Crumbs From the Table of Joy, Vivisections from a Blown Mind, and The Meeting. He served as dramaturge for Goodman's 2003 world premiere production of August Wilson's Gem of the Ocean. He directed the New York premiere of Knock Me a Kiss, receiving ADELCO awards for production and direction, and The Hooch for the New Federal Theatre. Regional credits include the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Seattle Repertory Theatre, Nashville Shakespeare Festival, Milwaukee Repertory Theater, Alabama Shakespeare Festival, the Ensemble Theatre in Houston, the Robey Theatre Company in Los Angeles, the University of Illinois in Champaign, University of Wisconsin in Madison, and Fisk University in Nashville. At Columbia College Chicago he was facilitator of the Theodore Ward Prize playwriting contest for 20 years and editor of the contest anthologies Seven Black Plays and Best Black Plays. He won a Chicago Emmy Award as associate producer/theatrical director for the NBC teleplay Crime of Innocence and was theatrical director for

the Emmy winning Fast Break to Glory and the Emmy-nominated The Martin Luther King Suite. He was a founding member of the Chicago Theatre Company, where he served as artistic director for four seasons and directed the Jeff-nominated Suspenders and the Jeff-winning musical Po'. Other Chicago area credits include the Victory Gardens Theater, Roosevelt University, DePaul University, Eclipse Theatre, ETA, Black Ensemble Theater, Northlight Theatre, MPAACT, Congo Square Theatre Company, The New Regal Theater, Kuumba Theatre Company, Fleetwood-Jordain Theatre, Pegasus Players, and the Timber Lake Playhouse. He is the proud recipient of the 1982 Paul Robeson Award and the 1997 Award of Merit presented by the Black Theater Alliance of Chicago. He is a 2003 inductee into the Chicago State University Gwendolyn Brooks Center's Literary Hall of Fame, and a 2001 Chicago Tribune Chicagoan of the Year. He has received lifetime achievement awards from The League of Chicago Theaters and the Joseph Jefferson Awards Committee. In 2019 he received an Honorary Ph.D. from his alma mater Governors State University.




ACTORS' EQUITY ASSOCIATION
